

OAA/ART's Program

ART, as one of the main initiatives of OAA, has the mission to provide humanitarian logistics assistance and educational programs for disaster victims in the Americas and to develop sustainable programs that establish longterm benefits for those in need. ART focuses on the following three programmatic areas:

- a. Disaster Preparedness, by conducting disaster prevention programs in urban centers and ports in Latin America:
- b. Disaster Response and Aid, by collaborating with partners to stage and deliver humanitarian aid after a crisis occurs; and
- c. Humanitarian Assistance to alleviate human suffering in the Americas.

To help LAC communities respond at the highest possible level during future critical events, ART provides planning, strategy development, and training along with the tools and resources needed to increase local preparedness and selfsufficiency. When disasters strike, ART provides humanitarian logistics assistance to coordinate targeted, efficient relief efforts to reduce the suffering of the most vulnerable people.





With the support of FedEx, ART and its partners developed and implemented the Community Port Resiliency Program (C-PreP) to improve the delivery of humanitarian aid and speed economic recovery following a disaster with the mission to elevate the preparedness and resilience of airports, seaports and communities in Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) region. C-PReP works with airports



to assess needs and apply proactive measures to ensure that they are operating at an optimum level to mitigate the impact of extreme events, respond effectively, and restore ordinary operations as quickly as possible. **C-PReP** uses self-assessment, focused planning, and targeted training to prepare airports to respond effectively to extreme events. Then, when a crisis strikes, **C-PReP** focuses on supporting essential employees and their families, engaging rapid damage assessment and repair, and promoting interagency cooperation and mutual aid. **C-PReP** seeks to:

- 1) Elevate an airport's ability to restore function and facilitate efficient delivery of humanitarian aid after a disaster strikes;
- 2) Maintain economic stability and/or hasten a region's, island's, or nation's economic recovery by restoring full airport function as quickly as possible; and
- 3) Reconcile these two intentions to maximize benefits and minimize conflicts.
